State Disability Inclusion Plan 2019–2023

The South Australian Government acknowledges and respects Aboriginal people as the State's first people and recognises their traditional relationship with Country.

Minister's message

I am proud to deliver South Australia's first State Disability Inclusion Plan – Inclusive SA – established as part of the *Disability Inclusion Act 2018 (SA)*.

South Australians living with disability and those in the service delivery sector have experienced their largest ever reforms with the recent full transition to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). While around 30,000 people are now receiving supports, one in five report living with disability in South Australia, highlighting the importance of inclusion planning.

In this new era of disability service delivery, development of the state plan has provided the opportunity to consult with members of the community with lived experience, in order to learn more about how the State Government can foster inclusion and accessibility in new ways. I am grateful to the many hundreds of South Australians who contributed to the consultation process through forums, emails, phone calls and online discussions.

Inclusive SA paves the way for a whole-of-government approach to inclusion, and I look forward to continuing the team effort required to bring about the necessary changes. Inclusivity benefits all South Australians, and together with local councils and State Government agencies, we are committed to delivering the economic and social benefits of a more inclusive state.

Inclusive SA

It is time for the State Government to lead by example and work to improve access and inclusion for people with disability. Inclusive SA is our commitment to create a more inclusive South Australia. It is our first State Disability Inclusion Plan and it will bring State Government agencies and local councils together to reduce the barriers faced by people living with disability.

In 2018, the *Disability Inclusion Act 2018 (SA)* was passed because we recognised that a stronger commitment was needed. This plan, and the Disability Access and Inclusion Plans (DAIPs) that State Government agencies and local councils will develop, will help ensure that new strategies address barriers and promote positive action.

Inclusive SA sets out specific actions for State Government agencies and local councils ('State authorities') to achieve. These will support the implementation of the *National Disability Strategy 2010–2020 (NDS)* and the principles agreed in the *United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD)*. Inclusive SA also complements the NDIS, as it aims to address access and inclusion for all South Australians living with disability, including people who are not NDIS participants.

While Inclusive SA sets the focus for the next four years, it is also a living document that will respond to shifting priorities and new information, as governments across Australia are working together to design a new national disability strategy for 2020 and beyond. Inclusive SA will also be updated to reflect social, political and environmental changes as well as any response to recommendations made by the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability. A revised plan will be published in 2021.

Community consultation

More than 300 enthusiastic people generated around one thousand ideas to help us develop Inclusive SA. The community shared examples of good practice and discussed where improvements could be made. People with lived experience of disability provided valuable input into the themes and priorities.

Working together, participants told us that people living with disability want to:

- be treated with respect and dignity
- find meaning in their lives
- make their own decisions
- be actively involved in their communities
- live somewhere that feels like home
- be able to get to places
- receive an education
- work
- feel safe
- have fun
- make friends
- be connected and informed
- understand their rights
- have access to the services they need.

Participants in the community consultation considered the specific situations of people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, women and children. The actions in this plan take those considerations into account. Further and more targeted consultation with these priority groups will take place during 2020 to ensure the revised plan in 2021 responds to their specific needs.

Principles

Principles are values that guide behaviour and create a shared understanding about what is important. This plan is based on the following principles for people living with disability:

- fundamental human rights, responsibility and autonomy
- individual worth and dignity
- participation in social and economic life
- the right to realise physical, social, sexual, reproductive, emotional and intellectual capacities
- the right to make decisions, including supported decisions and to take risks
- access to information in appropriate forms

- respect for cultural or linguistic diversity, age, gender, sexual orientation and religious beliefs
- rights to privacy and confidentiality
- live free from neglect, abuse and exploitation
- rights to pursue complaints and access justice
- acknowledge and respect the crucial role of families, carers and significant persons
- freedom of association and support to engage in family, social and friendship activities
- respect the needs and rights of children as they develop
- acknowledge and respect the abilities, strengths, goals and needs of people living with disability.

Vision

Our vision is an accessible and inclusive South Australia based on fairness and respect.

To achieve this vision, Inclusive SA focuses on the following themes:

- Inclusive communities for all
- Leadership and collaboration
- Accessible communities
- Learning and employment

Inclusive communities for all

Social inclusion is a priority for people living with disability as it affects all aspects of their lives. It is our aim that the contributions and rights of people living with disability are valued and understood by all South Australians and that their rights are promoted, upheld and protected. We also want to ensure that people living with disability are supported to advocate for their own rights.

Key words

Social inclusion, rights, community education and awareness, involvement in community.

Priority 1: Involvement in the community

Actions

1. Develop an event toolkit to promote accessible and inclusive practices for State authorities in community events.
2. Explore the redesign or creation of an app (or other medium) that displays existing and future services and facilities (such as toilets, eateries, sports and recreation facilities, parks and trails, arts organisations and cultural institutions, transport services, beaches that are wheelchair and disability-access friendly).
3. Develop and promote inclusive play guidelines to guide local councils and other community groups in the development of accessible and inclusive playgrounds and play spaces.
4. Collaborate with relevant organisations to run disability access and inclusion awareness training for arts organisations, cultural institutions, sporting organisations and clubs.
5. Explore opportunities to increase the involvement of children with disability in sports and cultural activities, for example:
 - expanding the Sports Voucher program for children living with disability
 - providing extra support for children living with disability to participate in VACSWIM
 - promoting the availability of arts programs for children living with disability.

Priority 2: Improving community understanding and awareness

Actions

6. Work with relevant State authorities to improve community understanding and awareness that complements and leverages the national effort under the *National Disability Strategy 2010–2020* and the emerging national disability strategy for beyond 2020.
7. Work with the Commonwealth Government to develop data indicators that measure changes in community attitudes about the rights and needs of people living with disability.

Priority 3: Promoting the rights of people living with disability

Actions

8. Review disability awareness training packages within State Government agencies, including public health settings, to establish best practice and implement for new and existing employees.
9. Ensure induction of new State authority employees includes information about working with people living with disability.

Being inclusive — Grants SA: Disability Inclusion, Department of Human Services

Disability inclusion has been included as a priority area within Grants SA funding rounds for 2019–20 to support innovation and opportunity for people living with disability.

The types of activities that may be considered to support disability inclusion include:

- the development of meaningful volunteer pathways
- programs in regional and rural communities
- improving wellbeing
- improving access to community centres, venues and social/support groups
- ensuring resources and communications are accessible
- investing in volunteer training and education.

Leadership and collaboration

People living with disability want to have a greater role in leading and contributing to government and community decision-making. It is our aim that the perspectives of people living with disability are actively sought and that they are supported to participate meaningfully in government and community consultation and engagement activities.

Key words

Participation, decision-making, engagement, consultation, leadership.

Priority 4: Participation in decision-making

Action

10. Share the learnings of the improved Supported Decision-Making approach for people living in State Government accommodation services with State authorities.
11. State authorities to support young people living with disability to actively participate in decision-making.

Priority 5: Leadership and raising profile

Action

12. Develop a communications strategy to promote BoardingCall, the South Australian Government recruitment register for boards and committees, to ensure it is promoted to people living with disability.
13. Ensure high quality and co-ordinated engagement with the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability, including providing consistent, accurate and relevant information, through a dedicated response unit led by the Attorney-General's Department.

Priority 6: Engagement and consultation

Actions

14. Develop a toolkit that supports State authorities to consult and engage with people living with disability when developing policies and programs, which:
 - promotes and explains co-design principles
 - focuses on supports for consultation within regional South Australia.
15. Review the function of the Disability Engagement Group to:
 - ensure membership is focused on people living with disability and carers
 - increase membership in rural and regional areas
 - increase the use of the Disability Engagement Group members in decision-making and policy initiatives
 - support members to develop advisory and leadership skills.

Accessible communities

The accessibility of the built environment, quality services and information is key to ensuring people living with disability are included and have the opportunity to equally participate in all aspects of community life. It is our aim to increase accessibility to public and community infrastructure, transport, services, information, sport and recreation and the greater community.

Key words

Built environment, Universal Design, health, wellness, access to services, transport, housing, belonging, and community.

Priority 7: Universal Design across South Australia

Actions

16. Elevate the design quality of South Australia's built environment and public realms through promoting design quality policy and the principles of Universal Design.
17. Explore the feasibility of adopting Universal Design procedures across State Government (as currently used by the Department of the Premier and Cabinet) in the design, construction, maintenance and procurement of all workplace environments, customer environments, systems, intranets and websites, and programs and policies. This will include:
 - applying Universal Design principles to sport and recreation infrastructure projects to support family friendly and accessible facilities
 - considering Universal Design principles in infrastructure works and maintenance across the Department for Environment and Water managed land, infrastructure and parks
 - adopting Liveable Housing Australia design guidelines for all new build social housing stock
 - considering incorporating Universal Design principles in residential construction and maintenance specifications for SA Housing Authority houses
 - improving access for people living with disability in the redevelopment of the Sir Samuel Way and Supreme Court buildings.
18. Contribute to the national conversation on the possibility of introducing Silver or Gold level Liveable Housing standards for all new housing to be applied through the National Construction Code from 2022.

19. Local council access and inclusion planning to consider consultation outcomes including:

- incorporating Universal Design principles in criteria for all new building and public projects and planning for programs, services and events
- developing Universal Design training plans for staff and contractors
- review of availability of accessible car parks.

Priority 8: Accessible and available information

Actions

20. Create the Inclusive SA website (and consider other communication media) to provide key resources for people living with disability and the community to raise awareness about disability.
21. Develop a toolkit to support State authorities to ensure communication about their services is available in a range of accessible formats. These may include easy read, Auslan, pictorial forms, large font, audible options, braille, closed captions and voice over.
22. Improve online accessibility of State Government websites, including through implementation of the Online Accessibility Policy and related guidelines.

Priority 9: Access to services

Actions

23. Continue to work collaboratively with the Commonwealth Government and the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) to develop strategies to support a diverse disability workforce, including within regional South Australia.
24. Further develop Auslan interpreter capacity (by drawing on people with lived experience).
25. Develop and promote a toolkit for signage, wayfinding and multimedia devices for State authorities to support deaf, hard of hearing, blind, vision or hearing-impaired persons.
26. State authorities to consider including in their infrastructure maintenance and upgrade schedules the installation of signs on the front of public buildings indicating disability access (where this has been assessed by an accredited access consultant) and installation of multi-media devices in queues at service outlets to include people who are deaf, hard of hearing, vision-impaired or blind.
27. Implement the Canine Court Companion pilot project to provide increased practical support and assistance to vulnerable victims and prosecution witnesses involved with the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP).
28. Continue to work with the Commonwealth Government to reform the Disability Standards for Accessible Public Transport 2002.
29. Ensure the state-owned bus fleet is accessible, including disability awareness training for frontline public transport staff and the consideration of voice systems in buses that notify people of the next stop.
30. Promote liaison and communication links between health services and disability support services, and improve the continuity of supports, including psychosocial supports, during hospitalisation.
31. Consider establishing minimum standards for priority parks and reserves (including coasts, heritage places and Crown land) that improve access and inclusion for people living with disability and implement a program of priority actions, including exemplar visitor experiences.

Being inclusive — State Sports Park, Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing

The development of the new wind tunnel facility at State Sports Park will provide world class training facilities for elite and developing athletes and para-athletes.

Being inclusive — Glenthorne National Park, Department for Environment and Water

The State Government is creating Glenthorne National Park in Adelaide’s southern suburbs. This new park is being developed using Universal Design principles and will be accessible and inclusive for the entire community. It will showcase the principles of Healthy Parks Healthy People – a partnership between the community, the Department for Environment and Water and Department for Health and Ageing that aims to improve our health and wellbeing through quality green space.

Being inclusive — Accessible website solution offered to all South Australian Government agencies, Department of the Premier and Cabinet

Audited by Vision Australia and user tested by Royal Society for the Blind (SA), Website Design System offers all South Australian Government agencies an accessible website solution through the Office for Digital Government, Department of the Premier and Cabinet. With increased accessibility as the reason for the development of government websites, Website Design System now provides agencies with a base website made up from over 30 modules built to the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG AA). Each module is managed centrally. Upgrades and accessibility updates are developed, tested and deployed once at the top level. They then cascade to all sites. Supported by [South Australian Government’s Online Accessibility Toolkit](#), solutions like Website Design System are highly valuable for digital inclusion as it now means inclusion is part of the planning stages for digital resources. It is no longer a costly afterthought.

Being inclusive — Disability Housing, SA Housing Authority

The SA Housing Authority built 100 disability homes, many with bespoke designs to meet the specific needs of individual households. The disability housing, which was built to standards incorporating Universal Design and Liveable Housing Australia design guidelines, has now been completed and transferred to community housing providers to manage.

Learning and employment

Workforce participation is fundamental to social inclusion. It provides economic independence and choice, social connections and friendships, value, identity and belonging. It is our aim that people living with disability have access to inclusive places of study and that education and training provides pathways to meaningful and inclusive employment and volunteering opportunities.

Key words

Employment, education, volunteering, learning, training, ability, flexibility.

Priority 10: Better supports within educational and training settings

Actions

32. State education and training sectors to support inclusive education culture and practices.
33. State education authorities to work in partnership with children, students, parents or carers, industries and the community to provide curriculum and learning opportunities that are personalised and tailored to the individual, and prepare for life beyond school.
34. Determine data required to measure and track the percentage of people living with disability participating and achieving in education and training.

Priority 11: Skill development through volunteering and support in navigating the pathway between learning and earning

Actions

35. Explore how pathways can be improved from education and training settings to post learning.
36. State authorities to facilitate meaningful volunteering opportunities for people living with disability.

Priority 12: Improved access to employment opportunities and better support within workplaces

Actions

37. Support and promote the implementation of the Office of the Commissioner for Public Sector Employment's *Public Sector Employment Strategy* across the public sector.
38. Increase employment opportunities across all levels in the South Australian public sector through the targeting of job opportunities for people living with disability under section 65 of the *Public Sector Act 2009* (SA) which provides for employment opportunity programs.
39. Develop data measures to track the percentage of people living with disability employed and retained in State authorities.

Being inclusive — Access for children on the autism spectrum, SA Museum

Museums can be loud and overwhelming places for children on the autism spectrum. As part of the South Australian Museum's Building a Culture of Access Program, the museum has implemented autism-friendly family mornings. During these mornings, children on the autism spectrum can visit the museum with their families outside of regular opening hours. By making small adjustments within the museum, such as altering sound and light levels and setting up quiet spaces, a sensory-friendly experience is created, improving access for people with disability in the community.

Ensuring Inclusive SA makes a difference

We want Inclusive SA to generate meaningful change and we also recognise there is still a lot of work ahead.

Achieving our vision will take time, extensive collaboration and ongoing reflection. This is why consultation with the community will continue, giving us the opportunity to adapt to the evolving needs of people living with disability.

Over the next year, each State authority will be developing their own Disability Access and Inclusion Plans (DAIPs) and be responsible for reporting annually. To ensure synergy across local councils and State Government agencies each DAIP will align to the priority areas set out in Inclusive SA.

To map our progress, we will use an initial set of interim measures (Appendix 1), while we develop an outcomes framework that will align with the new national disability strategy for beyond 2020. We will also report on our progress each year.

APPENDIX 1: INTERIM MEASURES

To map our progress, we will use the interim measures below as we work towards developing an outcomes framework that aligns with the new national disability strategy for beyond 2020. APPENDIX 2: WORDS AND ACRONYMS

Best practice

A method or technique that has been generally accepted as superior to any alternatives because it produces results that are better than those achieved by other means or because it has become a standard way of doing things.

Built environment

Artificial structures, features and facilities viewed collectively as an environment in which people live and work.

Co-design

A range of activities and processes used in the design of services and products that involve people who use or are affected by that service or product.

Commonwealth

The government of the Commonwealth of Australia – commonly referred to as the Australian Government or the Federal Government.

DAIP

Disability Access and Inclusion Plan prepared by State authorities for their own agency, department or council area.

Data indicators

A specific, observable and measurable set of information that can be used to show changes or progress being made toward achieving a specific outcome.

DHS

The South Australian Department of Human Services.

Disability Engagement Group

A DHS-led register which can be used by other government agencies or councils to obtain advice from people with disability and the sector about disability issues.

Local councils

A system of government in South Australia under which elected local government bodies (councils) are constituted under the *Local Government Act 1999* (SA).

NDIA

National Disability Insurance Agency.

NDIS

National Disability Insurance Scheme.

NDS

National Disability Strategy 2010–2020 — the strategy is a shared commitment by all governments to work together to improve the lives of Australians with disability by guiding governments and other organisations to build the wellbeing of people with disability and their carers.

National Disability Strategy for 2020 and beyond

The National Disability Strategy that will replace the existing *National Disability Strategy 2010–2020*.

State authority

As defined in the *Disability Inclusion Act 2018* (SA) to include a government department, an agency or instrumentality of the Crown, a local council constituted under the *Local Government Act 1999* (SA) or any other person or body declared by regulations to be included.

Supported decision-making

A model for supporting people with disabilities to make significant decisions and exercise their legal capacity.

Toolkit

SECTION 115

Ministerial Exemption ME9903068

TAKE notice that pursuant to section 115 of the *Fisheries Management Act 2007* (the Act), a licence holder or a registered master of a Northern Zone Rock Lobster Fishery licence (the 'exemption holder') is exempt from Section 70 of the *Fisheries Management Act 2007*, Regulation 5 and clause 18(1)(a) of Schedule 6 of the *Fisheries Management (General) Regulations 2017*, but only insofar as the exemption holders are permitted to operate rock lobster pots set in waters specified in Schedule 1, less than 100 metres depth without a pot spike, being a metal rod fastened to the base of the pot, subject to conditions specified in Schedule 2, from 1 November 2019 until 30 October 2020, unless varied or revoked earlier.

SCHEDULE 1

Waters of the Northern Zone excluding aquatic reserves and Sanctuary Zones or Restricted Area Zones of any Marine Park.

1. The rock lobster pots used pursuant to this exemption must have a cove mouth opening (inner or outer) that consists of either:
 - a. A rigid metal frame rectangular or square in shape with two opposite sides opening to not more than 135 mm; or
 - b. A rigid metal frame circular in shape opening to not more than 150 mm in diameter.
2. Prior to using any rock lobster pot fitted as described in condition 1 in the 2019/20 fishing season the exemption holder must provide to the PIRSA Fisheries and Aquaculture in writing at GPO Box 1625, Adelaide 5001, or email Annabel.jones@sa.gov.au including the following information:
 - a. A description of the metal frame attached to the cove mouth of all pots to be used; and
 - b. The total number of pots fitted with the rectangular or circular metal frame on the cove mouth that are to be used by that licence holder.
3. The exemption holder must complete a South Australian Managed Fisheries Wildlife Interaction Form following any interaction between the exempted rock lobster pots and threatened, endangered or protected species (TEPS).

4. Completed South Australian Managed Fisheries Wildlife Interaction Forms must be submitted to SARDI within 28 days of any interaction.
5. Whilst engaged in the exempted activity, the exemption holder must have in their possession a copy of this notice, and produce that notice to a PIRSA Fisheries Officer upon request.
6. The exemption holder must not contravene or fail to comply with the *Fisheries Management Act 2007*, or any other regulations made under that Act, except where specifically exempted by this notice.

This notice does not purport to override the provisions or operation of any other Act including, but not limited to, the *Marine Parks Act 2007*. The exemption holder must comply with any relevant regulations, permits, requirements and directions from the Department for Environment and Water when undertaking activities within a marine park.

Liquor Licensing (Dry Areas) Notice 2019

under section 131(1a) of the *Liquor Licensing Act 1997*

1—Short title

This notice may be cited as the *Liquor Licensing (Dry Areas) Notice 2019*.

2—Commencement

This notice comes into operation on 22 November 2019.

3—Interpretation

(1) In this notice—

principal notice means the *Liquor Licensing (Dry Areas) Notice 2015* published in the Gazette on 5.1.15, as in force from time to time.

(2) Clause 3 of the principal notice applies to this notice as if it were the principal notice.

4—Consumption etc of liquor prohibited in dry areas

(1) Pursuant to section 131 of the Act, the consumption and possession of liquor in the area described in the Schedule is prohibited in accordance with the provisions of the Schedule.

(2) The prohibition has effect during the periods specified in the Schedule.

- (3) The prohibition does not extend to private land in the area described in the Schedule.
- (4) Unless the contrary intention appears, the prohibition of the possession of liquor in the area does not extend to—
 - (a) a person who is genuinely passing through the area if—
 - (i) the liquor is in the original container in which it was purchased from licensed premises; and
 - (ii) the container has not been opened; or
 - (b) a person who has possession of the liquor in the course of carrying on a business or in the course of his or her employment by another person in the course of carrying on a business; or
 - (c) a person who is permanently or temporarily residing at premises within the area or on the boundary of the area and who enters the area solely for the purpose of passing through it to enter those premises or who enters the area from those premises for the purpose of leaving the area.



2—Commencement

This notice comes into operation on 22 November 2019.

3—Interpretation

(1) In this notice—

principal notice means the *Liquor Licensing (Dry Areas) Notice 2015* published in the Gazette on 5.1.15, as in force from time to time.

(2) Clause 3 of the principal notice applies to this notice as if it were the principal notice.

4—Consumption etc of liquor prohibited in dry areas

- (1) Pursuant to section 131 of the Act, the consumption and possession of liquor in the area described in the Schedule is prohibited in accordance with the provisions of the Schedule.
- (2) The prohibition has effect during the periods specified in the Schedule.
- (3) The prohibition does not extend to private land in the area described in the Schedule.
- (4) Unless the contrary intention appears, the prohibition of the possession of liquor in the area does not extend to—
 - (a) a person who is genuinely passing through the area if—
 - (i) the liquor is in the original container in which it was purchased from licensed premises; and
 - (ii) the container has not been opened; or
 - (b) a person who has possession of the liquor in the course of carrying on a business or in the course of his or her employment by another person in the course of carrying on a business; or
 - (c) a person who is permanently or temporarily residing at premises within the area or on the boundary of the area and who enters the area solely for the purpose of passing through it to enter those premises or who enters the area from those premises for the purpose of leaving the area





- (3) A reference in subregulation (2) to a person being *employed* will be taken to include a reference to a person who—
 - (a) carries out work under a contract for services; and
 - (b) undertakes practical training as part of an educational or vocational course,

and a reference to *employer* and *employment* is to be construed accordingly.

employment condition includes any condition or requirement breach of which would constitute grounds for the taking of an action described in section 10(d) of the Act (including, to avoid doubt, a requirement to observe a code of conduct);

- (a) a finding (constituting a conviction for the purposes of the Act) that is taken to be immediately spent under section 4(1a) of the Act; or

- (a) if the relevant finding or conviction is in relation to an eligible juvenile offence other than where the person was dealt with as an adult—5 consecutive years; or
- (b) in any other case—10 consecutive years,

from the day on which the finding or conviction is taken to be immediately spent.



 - (i) the liquor is in the original container in which it was purchased from licensed premises; and
 - (ii) the container has not been opened; or
 - (b) a person who has possession of the liquor in the course of carrying on a business or in the course of his or her employment by another person in the course of carrying on a business; or
 - (c) a person who is permanently or temporarily residing at premises within the area or on the boundary of the area and who enters the area solely for the purpose of passing through it to enter those premises or who enters the area from those premises for the purpose of leaving the area.







By-law made under the Local Government Act 1999

PERMITS AND PENALTIES BY-LAW 2019**By-Law No 1 of 2019**

To provide for a permit system, set penalties for breaches of By-laws, provide for certain matters pertaining to liability and evidence, set regulatory requirements, clarify the construction of Council's By-laws and for related purposes.

Part 1 – Preliminary**1. Short Title**

This By-law may be cited as the *Permits and Penalties By-law 2019*.

2. Commencement

This By-law will come into operation four months after the day on which it is published in the *Gazette* in accordance with Section 249(5) of the *Local Government Act 1999*.

3. Purpose

The objectives of this By-law are to provide for the good rule and government of the Council area, and for the convenience, comfort and safety of its community by:

- 3.1 creating a permit system for Council By-laws;
- 3.2 providing for the enforcement of breaches of Council By-laws and fixing penalties; and
- 3.3 clarifying the construction of Council By-laws.

4. Definitions

4.1 In any By-law of the Council, unless the contrary intention is clearly indicated:

- 4.1.1 **authorised person** means a person appointed as an authorised person pursuant to Section 260 of the *Local Government Act 1999*;
- 4.1.2 **Council** means the District Council of Ceduna;
- 4.1.3 **drive** a vehicle means to be in control of the steering, movement or propulsion of the vehicle;
- 4.1.4 **driver** of a vehicle means the person driving the vehicle;
- 4.1.5 **motor vehicle** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic Act 1961*;

- 4.1.6 **notice in writing** includes, depending on the context, an email, letter, advertisement placed in a newspaper circulating in the area of the Council, information posted on Council's website, or information placed on a sign;
 - 4.1.7 **person** includes a natural person, a body corporate or incorporated association;
 - 4.1.8 **road** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*; and
 - 4.1.9 **vehicle** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic Act 1961* and the *Australian Road Rules*.
- 4.2 In this By-law:
- 4.2.1 **owner** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic Act 1961*; and
 - 4.2.2 **prescribed offence** means an offence against a By-law of the Council relating to the driving, parking or standing of vehicles.

5. Construction

Every By-law of the Council shall be subject to any Act of Parliament and Regulations made thereunder.

Part 2 – Permits

6. Council may grant permits

If any By-law of the Council states that a person needs a 'permit' or 'permission' to do a specified thing, then the following provisions apply:

- 6.1 The person seeking the grant of permission must submit a written application to the Council in the form (if any) and accompanied by the fee (if any) prescribed by the Council.
- 6.2 The Council may:
 - 6.2.1 attach conditions to the permit;
 - 6.2.2 change or revoke a condition, by notice in writing; or
 - 6.2.3 add new conditions, by notice in writing.
- 6.3 A person who holds a permit must comply with every condition attached to it. Failure to do so constitutes a breach of this By-law.
- 6.4 The Council may revoke a permit, by notice in writing, if:
 - 6.4.1 the holder of the permit fails to comply with a condition attached to it; or
 - 6.4.2 the permit is of a continuing nature, and the Council has reasonable grounds for revoking it.

- 6.5 The Council may, by resolution, fix, vary or revoke fees or charges for the granting of a permit to do a specified thing.

Part 3 – Enforcement

7. Penalties

- 7.1 A person who contravenes, or fails to comply with any By-law of the Council is guilty of an offence and is liable to a maximum penalty, being the maximum penalty referred to in the *Local Government Act 1999*, which may be fixed for offences against a By-law.
- 7.2 A person who is convicted of an offence against any By-law of the Council in respect of a continuing act or omission is liable, in addition to the penalty otherwise applicable, to a further penalty, being the maximum penalty referred to in the *Local Government Act 1999* which may be fixed for offences of a continuing nature against a By-law.

8. Liability of vehicles owners and expiation of certain offences

- 8.1 Without derogating from the liability of any other person, but subject to this clause, if a vehicle is involved in a prescribed offence, the owner of the vehicle is guilty of an offence and liable to the same penalty as is prescribed for the principal offence and the expiation fee that is fixed for the principal offence applies in relation to an offence against this clause.
- 8.2 The owner and driver of a vehicle are not both liable through the operation of this clause to be convicted of an offence arising out of the same circumstances, and consequently conviction of the owner exonerates the driver and conversely conviction of the driver exonerates the owner.
- 8.3 An expiation notice or expiation reminder notice given under the *Expiation of Offences Act 1996* to the owner of a vehicle for an alleged prescribed offence involving the vehicle must be accompanied by a notice inviting the owner, if they were not the driver at the time of the alleged prescribed offence, to provide the Council or officer specified in the notice, within the period specified in the notice, with a statutory declaration:
- 8.3.1 setting out the name and address of the driver; or
- 8.3.2 if they had transferred ownership of the vehicle to another prior to the time of the alleged offence and has complied with the *Motor Vehicles Act 1959* in respect of the transfer - setting out details of the transfer (including the name and address of the transferee).
- 8.4 Before proceedings are commenced against the owner of a vehicle for an offence against this section involving the vehicle, the complainant must send the owner a notice:
- 8.4.1 setting out particulars of the alleged prescribed offence; and
- 8.4.2 inviting the owner, if he or she was not the driver at the time of the alleged prescribed offence, to provide the complainant, within 21 days of the date of the notice, with a statutory declaration setting out the matters referred to in sub-clause 8.3.

- 8.5 Sub-clause 8.4 does not apply to:
- 8.5.1 proceedings commenced where an owner has elected under the *Expiation of Offences Act 1996* to be prosecuted for the offence; or
 - 8.5.2 proceedings commenced against an owner of a vehicle who has been named in a statutory declaration under this section as the driver of the vehicle.
- 8.6 Subject to sub-clause 8.7, in proceedings against the owner of a vehicle for an offence against this sub-clause, it is a defence to prove:
- 8.6.1 that, in consequence of some unlawful act, the vehicle was not in the possession or control of the owner at the time of the alleged prescribed offence; or
 - 8.6.2 that the owner provided the complainant with a statutory declaration in accordance with an invitation under this clause.
- 8.7 The defence in sub-clause 8.6.2 does not apply if it is proved that the owner made the declaration knowing it to be false in a material particular.
- 8.8 If:
- 8.8.1 an expiation notice is given to a person named as the alleged driver in a statutory declaration under this sub-clause; or
 - 8.8.2 proceedings are commenced against a person named as the alleged driver in such a statutory declaration,
- the notice or information, as the case may be, must be accompanied by a notice setting out particulars of the statutory declaration that named the person as the alleged driver.
- 8.9 The particulars of the statutory declaration provided to the person named as the alleged driver must not include the address of the person who provided the statutory declaration.

9. Evidence

In proceedings for a prescribed offence, an allegation in an information that:

- 9.1 a specified place was a road or local government land; or
- 9.2 a specified vehicle was driven, parked or left standing in a specified place; or
- 9.3 a specified vehicle was parked or left standing for the purposes of soliciting business from a person or offering or exposing goods for sale; or
- 9.4 a specified place was not formed or otherwise set aside by the Council for the purposes of the driving, parking or standing of vehicles; or
- 9.5 a specified person was an authorised person; or
- 9.6 a specified provision was a condition of a specified permit granted under clause 6 of this By-law; or

- 9.7 a specified person was the owner or driver of a specified vehicle; or
- 9.8 a person named in a statutory declaration under clause 8 of this By-law for the prescribed offence to which the declaration relates was the driver of the vehicle at the time at which the alleged offence was committed; or
- 9.9 an owner or driver of a vehicle for a prescribed offence was given notice under clause 8 of this By-law on a specified day,

is proof of the matters so alleged in the absence of proof to the contrary.

Part 4 – Miscellaneous

10. Revocation

Council's *By-law No. 1 – Permits and Penalties*, published in the *Gazette* on 8 August 2013, is revoked on the day on which this By-law comes into operation.

MOVEABLE SIGNS BY-LAW 2019**By-Law No 2 of 2019**

To set standards for moveable signs on roads, to provide conditions for and the placement of such signs, to protect safety and to protect or enhance the amenity of the area of the Council.

Part 1 – Preliminary**1. Short Title**

This By-law may be cited as the *Moveable Signs By-law 2019*.

2. Commencement

This By-law will come into operation four months after the day on which it is published in the *Gazette* in accordance with Section 249(5) of the Act.

3. Purpose

The objectives of this By-law is to set standards for moveable signs on roads and Local Government land:

- 3.1 to protect the comfort and safety of road users and members of the public;
- 3.2 to enhance the amenity of roads and surrounding parts of the Council area;
- 3.3 to prevent nuisances occurring on roads;
- 3.4 to prevent unreasonable interference with the use of a road; and
- 3.5 for the good rule and government of the Council area.

4. Definitions

In this By-law:

- 4.1 ***banner*** means a moveable sign constituted of a strip of cloth, plastic or other material hung or attached to a pole, fence or other structure;
- 4.2 ***business premises*** means premises from which a business is being conducted;
- 4.3 ***footpath*** means:

- 4.3.1 a footway, lane or other place made or constructed for the use of pedestrians; or
- 4.3.2 that part of road between the property boundary of the road and the edge of the carriageway on the same side as that boundary;
- 4.4 **moveable sign** has the same meaning as the *Local Government Act 1999*;
- 4.5 **road** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*;
- 4.6 **road related area** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic Act 1961*; and
- 4.7 **vehicle** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic Act 1961*.

Part 2 – Provisions Applicable to Moveable Signs

5. Design and construction

A moveable sign displayed on a road must:

- 5.1 be of a kind known as an 'A' frame or sandwich board sign, an 'inverted 'T'' sign or a flat sign, a 'tear drop' sign, a banner, or, with the permission of the Council, a sign of some other kind;
- 5.2 be designed, constructed and maintained in good condition so as not to present a hazard to any member of the public;
- 5.3 be of strong construction so as to be stable when in position and to be able to keep its position in adverse weather conditions;
- 5.4 not contain any sharp or jagged edges or corners;
- 5.5 not be unsightly or offensive in appearance or content;
- 5.6 be constructed of timber, cloth, metal, plastic or plastic coated cardboard, or a mixture of such materials;
- 5.7 not contain flashing lights or be illuminated internally;
- 5.8 subject to paragraph 5.9, not be more than 1 metre high, 600mm wide and 600mm deep;
- 5.9 in the case of a 'tear drop' sign, not be more than 2.4 metres high, 600mm wide and 600mm deep;
- 5.10 be stable when in position;
- 5.11 in the case of an 'A' frame or sandwich board sign:
 - 5.11.1 be hinged or joined at the top;
 - 5.11.2 be of such construction that its sides shall be securely fixed or locked in position when erected; and
 - 5.11.3 not have a base area in excess of 0.6 square metres; and

- 5.12 in the case of an 'inverted 'T'' sign, contain no struts or supports that run between the display area and the base of the sign.

6. Appearance

A moveable sign must, in the opinion of an authorised person:

- 6.1 be painted or otherwise detailed in a competent and professional manner;
- 6.2 be aesthetically appealing, legible and simply worded to convey a precise message;
- 6.3 be of such design and contain such colours as are compatible with the architectural design of the premises adjacent to the sign, and which relate well to the townscape and overall amenity of the locality in which it is situated and not detract from or conflict with traffic, safety or direction signs or signals; and
- 6.4 contain combinations of colour and typographical styles which blend in with and reinforce the heritage qualities of the locality and the buildings where it is situated.

7. Banners

A banner must:

- 7.1 only be displayed on a road, footpath or road related area;
- 7.2 be securely fixed to a pole, fence or other structure so that it does not hang loose or flap;
- 7.3 not be attached to any building, structure, fence, vegetation or other item owned by the Council on a road, or other improvement to a road owned by the Council;
- 7.4 not be displayed more than one month before and two days after the event it advertises;
- 7.5 not be displayed for a continuous period of more than one month and two days in any twelve month period; and
- 7.6 not exceed 3m² in size.

8. Placement

A moveable sign displayed on a road must:

- 8.1 not be placed anywhere except on the footpath;
- 8.2 be set back from the kerb by no less than 500mm;
- 8.3 where there is no kerb to define the footpath area, be set back from the edge of the carriageway by no less than 500mm;

- 8.4 in the case of a flat sign, the message of which only contains newspaper headlines and the name of a newspaper, be in line with and against the business to which it relates;
- 8.5 be no less than 1.5 metres from any structure, property boundary, fixed object, tree, bush, plant or other moveable sign;
- 8.6 be adjacent to the premises of the business to which it relates;
- 8.7 not be placed on a sealed part of any footpath area unless the sealed part is wide enough to contain the sign and still leave a clear thoroughfare of at least 1.5 metres;
- 8.8 not be placed within 10 metres of the corner of a road;
- 8.9 not be placed within 10 metres of an intersection of a road;
- 8.10 not be placed on a landscaped area, other than on landscaping that comprises only lawn;
- 8.11 not be placed on a designated parking area or within 1 metre of an entrance to or exit from premises;
- 8.12 not be placed on a footpath adjacent to a bus stop, loading zone or taxi rank; and
- 8.13 not unreasonably restrict the use of the footpath area.

9. Restrictions

A moveable sign displayed on a road must:

- 9.1 only display material which advertises a business being conducted on commercial premises adjacent to the sign or the products available from that business;
- 9.2 be limited in number to one moveable sign per business premises;
- 9.3 only be displayed when the business to which it relates is open to the public;
- 9.4 be securely fixed in position such that it cannot be blown over or swept away;
- 9.5 not be placed in such a position or in such circumstances that the safety of any user of the road is at risk;
- 9.6 not be displayed during the hours of darkness unless it is in a clearly lit area and is clearly visible;
- 9.7 not be displayed on, attached, or adjacent to a vehicle that is parked on a road primarily for the purpose of advertising or offering for sale a product (including the vehicle) or business to which the sign relates; and
- 9.8 not to be displayed on a median strip, traffic island or on a carriageway of a street or road.

Part 3 – Enforcement**10. Removal of non-complying moveable signs**

- 10.1 An authorised person may order the owner of a sign to remove the sign from the road if:
- 10.1.1 the design or construction of a moveable sign that has been placed on a road does not comply with a requirement of this By-law; or
 - 10.1.2 the positioning of a moveable sign does not comply with a requirement of this By-law; or
 - 10.1.3 any other relevant requirement of this By-law is not complied with; or
 - 10.1.4 the moveable sign unreasonably:
 - 10.1.4.1 restricts the use of the road; or
 - 10.1.4.2 endangers the safety of members of the public.
- 10.2 A person must comply with an order of an authorised person made pursuant to subparagraph 10.1 of this By-law.
- 10.3 If the authorised person cannot find the owner, or the owner fails to comply immediately with the order of an authorised person, the authorised person may remove and dispose of the moveable sign.
- 10.4 The owner or other person entitled to recover a moveable sign removed pursuant to subparagraph 10.3 of this By-law must pay to the Council any reasonable costs incurred by the Council in removing, storing and attempting to dispose of the moveable sign before being entitled to recover the moveable sign.

11. Removal of complying moveable signs

- 11.1 The owner of, or other person responsible for, a moveable sign must remove or relocate the moveable sign at the request of an authorised person if, in the reasonable opinion of that authorised person, and notwithstanding compliance with this By-law, there is any hazard or obstruction or there is likely to be a hazard or obstruction arising out of the location of the moveable sign.
- 11.2 The owner of, or other person responsible for, a moveable sign must remove or relocate the moveable sign at the request of an authorised person for the purpose of special events, parades, road works or in any other circumstances which, in the reasonable opinion of the authorised person, requires relocation or removal of the moveable sign to protect public safety or to protect or enhance the amenity of a particular locality.

Part 4 – Miscellaneous**12. Specified exemptions**

- 12.1 This By-law does not apply to a moveable sign which:

- 12.1.1 is a moveable sign that is placed on a public road pursuant to an authorisation under the *Local Government Act 1999* or another Act;
 - 12.1.2 directs people to the open inspection of any land or building that is available for purchase or lease;
 - 12.1.3 directs people to a garage sale that is being held on residential premises, provided that no more than six such signs are displayed at any one time in relation to a particular garage sale;
 - 12.1.4 directs people to a charitable function;
 - 12.1.5 is related to a State or Commonwealth election and is displayed during the period commencing at 5.00pm on the day before the day of the issue of writ or writs for the election and ending at the close of polls on polling day;
 - 12.1.6 is related to an election held under the *Local Government Act 1999* or the *Local Government (Elections) Act 1999* and is displayed during the period commencing four weeks immediately before the date that has been set for polling day and ending at the close of voting on polling day;
 - 12.1.7 is related to a referendum and is displayed during the course and for the purpose of that referendum;
 - 12.1.8 is displayed with permission of the Council and in accordance with any conditions attached to that permission; or
 - 12.1.9 is a sign of a class prescribed in regulations.
- 12.2 Paragraphs 9.1, 9.2 and 9.3 of this By-law do not apply to a flat sign containing only the banner or headlines of a newspaper or magazine.
- 13. Prohibition**
- 13.1 The Council may, by resolution, prohibit the display of moveable signs on a road or part of road subject to this paragraph.
 - 13.2 A resolution made by the Council under subparagraph 13.1 may prohibit the display of moveable signs absolutely, or at particular times or on particular days.
 - 13.3 The Council may only make a resolution under subparagraph 13.1 if, in the opinion of the Council, the display of movable signs on the road would endanger the safety of road users or otherwise be unsuitable.
 - 13.4 Notwithstanding any other paragraph of this By-law, a person must not display a moveable sign on a road or part of a road contrary to a prohibition made by the Council under this paragraph.

14. Revocation

Council's *By-law No 2 – Moveable Signs*, published in the *Gazette* on 8 August 2013, is revoked on the day on which this By-law comes into operation.

By-law made under the Local Government Act 1999

LOCAL GOVERNMENT LAND BY-LAW 2019**By-Law No. 3 of 2019**

For the management and regulation of the use of and access to all land vested in or under the control of Council, including the prohibition and regulation of particular activities on local government land and related purposes.

Part 1 – Preliminary**1. Short Title**

This By-law may be cited as the *Local Government Land By-law 2019*.

2. Commencement

This By-law will come into operation four months after the day on which it is published in the *Gazette* in accordance with Section 249(5) of the Act.

3. Purpose

The objectives of this By-law are to regulate the access to and use of local government land (other than roads), and certain public places:

- 3.1 to prevent and mitigate nuisances;
- 3.2 to prevent damage to local government land;
- 3.3 to protect the convenience, comfort and safety of members of the public;
- 3.4 to enhance the amenity of the Council area; and
- 3.5 for the good rule and government of the area.

4. Interpretation

In this By-law:

- 4.1 **adjacent land** has the same meaning as in the *Harbors and Navigation Act 1993*;
- 4.2 **animal** includes birds, insects and fish;
- 4.3 **boat** includes a raft, canoe, personal watercraft or any other similar device;

- 4.4 **boat harbour** means any local government land, adjacent land or subjacent land declared by the Council to constitute a boat harbour for the purposes of this By-law;
- 4.5 **boat ramp launching basin** means any local government land, adjacent land or subjacent land declared by the Council to constitute a boat ramp launching basin for the purposes of this By-law;
- 4.6 **boat ramp parking area** means any local government land declared by the Council to constitute a boat ramp parking area for the purposes of this By-law;
- 4.7 **camp** includes setting up a camp, or causing or allowing a tent, sleeping bag, caravan or motor home to remain on land for the purpose of staying overnight whether or not any person is in attendance or sleeps on the land;
- 4.8 **children's playground** means any enclosed area in which there is equipment, apparatus or other installed devices for the purpose of children's play (or within 5 metres of such devices if there is no enclosed area);
- 4.9 **coastal slope or cliff and sand dune** means the sand dunes, coastal slopes, cliffs and other geomorphologic coastal forms under the care, control and management of Council;
- 4.10 **community garden** means an area of land set aside by the Council for the purposes of being gardened collectively by a group of people;
- 4.11 **e-cigarette** means:
- 4.11.1 a device that is designed to generate or release an aerosol or vapour for inhalation by its user in a manner similar to the inhalation of smoke from an ignited tobacco product; or
- 4.11.2 a device of a kind resolved by the Council and notified by notice in the *Gazette* to be an e-cigarette;
- 4.12 **effective control** means a person exercising effective control of an animal either:
- 4.12.1 by means of a physical restraint; or
- 4.12.2 by command, the animal being in close proximity to the person and the person being able to see the animal at all times;
- 4.13 **electoral matter** has the same meaning as in the *Electoral Act 1985* provided that such electoral matter is not capable of causing physical damage or injury to any person within its immediate vicinity;
- 4.14 **emergency worker** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic (Road Rules – Ancillary and Miscellaneous Provisions) Regulations 2014*;
- 4.15 **foreshore** means land extending from the edge of any navigable waterway or body of water in the Council's area to the nearest road or section boundary or for a distance of 50 metres (whichever is lesser);

- 4.16 **funeral ceremony** means a ceremony only (i.e. a memorial service) and does not include a burial;
- 4.17 **inflatable castle** includes a bouncy castle, jumping castle and any other inflatable structure used for recreational purposes;
- 4.18 **liquor** has the same meaning as defined in the *Liquor Licensing Act 1997*;
- 4.19 **local government land**:
- 4.19.1 has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*; and
- 4.19.2 in paragraphs 5.10, 5.11 and 6.2 includes any adjacent land and subjacent land,
- but does not include any road;
- 4.20 **low water mark** means the shoreline water level at the lowest meteorological tide;
- 4.21 **marina** means any local government land, adjacent land or subjacent land declared by the Council to constitute a marina for the purposes of this By-law;
- 4.22 **motor home** means a recreational self-contained vehicle which is not a caravan and includes electrical and plumbing facilities;
- 4.23 **offensive** includes threatening, abusive, insulting or annoying behaviour and offend has a complimentary meaning;
- 4.24 **open container** means a container which:
- 4.24.1 after the contents thereof have been sealed at the time of manufacture and:
- 4.24.1.1 being a bottle, has had its cap, cork or top removed (whether or not it has since been replaced);
- 4.24.1.2 being a can, it has been opened or punctured;
- 4.24.1.3 being a cask, has had its tap placed in a position to allow it to be used;
- 4.24.1.4 being any form of container, it has been opened, broken, punctured or manipulated in such a way as to allow access to the contents thereof; or
- 4.24.2 is a flask, glass or mug or other container used for drinking purposes;
- 4.25 **organised competition or sport** does not include social play;
- 4.26 **personal watercraft** means a device that:
- 4.26.1 is propelled by a motor; and
- 4.26.2 has a fully enclosed hull; and

- 4.26.3 is designed not to retain water if capsized; and
- 4.26.4 is designed to be operated by a person who sits astride, stands, or kneels on the device,
- and includes the device commonly referred to as a jet ski;
- 4.27 **smoke** means:
- 4.27.1 in relation to a tobacco product, smoke, hold, or otherwise have control over, an ignited tobacco product; or
- 4.27.2 in relation to an e-cigarette, to inhale from, hold or otherwise have control over, an e-cigarette that is in use;
- 4.28 **subjacent land** has the same meaning as in the *Harbors and Navigation Act 1993*;
- 4.29 **tobacco product** has the same meaning as in the *Tobacco and E-Cigarette Products Act 1997*;
- 4.30 **traffic control device** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic Act 1961*;
- 4.31 **variable message sign** includes a permanent, portable or vehicle mounted electronic sign (except when the sign is used as a traffic control device);
- 4.32 **vulnerable person** means a person whose parent or guardian reasonably believes requires supervision or care;
- 4.33 **waters** means any body of water including a pond, lake, river, creek or wetlands under the care, control and management of the Council;
- 4.34 **wharf** means any structure on local government land, adjacent land or subjacent land declared by the Council to constitute a wharf for the purposes of this By-law.

Part 2 – Management of Local Government Land

5. Activities requiring permission

A person must not on any local government land, without the permission of the Council:

5.1 Advertising

display any sign for the purpose of commercial advertising other than a moveable sign which is displayed in accordance with the *Moveable Signs By-law 2019*;

5.2 Aircraft

subject to the *Civil Aviation Act 1988*, land any aircraft on, or take off any aircraft from any land excluding the Ceduna Airport;

5.3 Amplification

use an amplifier or other device, whether mechanical or electrical, for the purpose of amplifying sound to the public;

5.4 Animals

5.4.1 cause or allow any animal to stray onto, move over, graze or be left unattended;

5.4.2 cause or allow any animal to enter, swim, bathe or remain in any waters located on local government land to which the Council has resolved this subparagraph shall apply;

5.4.3 lead or drive a horse, cattle sheep or goat, except where the Council has set aside a track or other area for use by or in connection with an animal of that kind;

5.5 Annoyance

do anything likely to offend or unreasonably interfere with any other person:

5.5.1 using that land; or

5.5.2 occupying nearby premises,

by making an unreasonable noise in the circumstances or creating a disturbance of the peace;

5.6 Aquatic life

introduce any non-native aquatic life to any waters;

5.7 Athletic, fitness and ball sports

5.7.1 promote, organise or take part in any organised athletic sport or fitness activity;

5.7.2 play any organised competition sport;

5.7.3 play or practise the game of golf;

5.8 Attachments

attach anything to a tree, plant, structure or fixture on local government land;

5.9 Bees

place, or allow to remain, any bee hive;

5.10 Boats, boat ramps and marinas

Subject to the provisions of the *Harbors and Navigation Act 1993* and the *Marine Safety (Domestic Commercial Vessel) National Law*:

- 5.10.1 launch or retrieve a boat to or from any waters where the Council has determined that this subparagraph applies;
 - 5.10.2 launch or retrieve a boat from any boat ramp to which the Council has determined this subparagraph applies other than in accordance with any conditions specified on a sign or signs erected in the vicinity of the boat ramp, including (but not limited to) conditions which may restrict the type of boat that may be launched from that boat ramp;
 - 5.10.3 moor a boat in any waters or to local government land to which the Council has determined this subparagraph applies;
 - 5.10.4 moor any boat on or to local government land, other than in accordance with any time limits and other conditions (if any) determined by resolution of the Council and contained in any signage erected in the vicinity;
 - 5.10.5 allow a boat to be moored at any berth in a marina;
 - 5.10.6 allow a boat to be berthed alongside a wharf in a marina;
 - 5.10.7 allow a boat to be moored in a boat ramp launching basin;
 - 5.10.8 stay overnight on a boat moored in a marina, boat ramp launching basin or boat ramp parking area;
 - 5.10.9 undertake major repairs to a moored boat in a marina;
 - 5.10.10 undertake minor repairs to a moored boat in a marina, other than minor repairs carried out within the confines of the boat itself and between the hours of 7am and 8pm Monday to Saturday only;
 - 5.10.11 use angle grinders, sand blasters or other electrical power tools or welding equipment on a boat in a marina, boat ramp launching basin or boat ramp parking area, except for minor maintenance work;
 - 5.10.12 hire out a boat or otherwise use a boat for commercial purposes; or
 - 5.10.13 hire out a boat on or from the foreshore.
 - 5.10.14 jump, dive or swim from any boat ramp or similar type of infrastructure;
 - 5.10.15 allow a vehicle to remain stationary on a boat ramp longer than is reasonably necessary to launch or retrieve a boat;
- 5.11 **Boat harbours**
- 5.11.1 intentionally interfere with any of the moorings in a boat harbour;
 - 5.11.2 anchor or moor a boat in a boat harbour in a manner that causes the boat to obstruct the entrance to the harbour;
 - 5.11.3 throw, discharge, or place any marine offal or waste, sewerage, food waste or other rubbish of any kind, into waters or surrounds of a boat harbour;

- 5.11.4 fish, swim, dive, scuba dive, or snorkel in a boat harbour or conduct or participate in any water sport in a boat harbour; or
 - 5.11.5 handle any fuel or dangerous or flammable substance in such a manner that may expose a person or property to damage;
- 5.12 Camping and tents**
- 5.12.1 camp or stay overnight, other than in an area which has been set aside by the Council for camping purposes and, in accordance with any conditions that may be determined by resolution of the Council and contained in any signage erected thereon;
 - 5.12.2 erect any tent, booth, marquee or other structure for the purpose of habitation on any land to which the Council has determined this subparagraph applies; or
 - 5.12.3 camp on any land for longer than any time period that the Council has resolved applies;
- 5.13 Canvassing and preaching**
- preach, canvass, harangue or otherwise solicit for religious purposes except on any land or part thereof where the Council has, by resolution, determined this restriction shall not apply;
- 5.14 Burials and Memorials**
- 5.14.1 bury or inter any human or animal remains;
 - 5.14.2 erect any memorial;
- 5.15 Closed lands**
- enter or remain on any part of local government land:
- 5.15.1 at any time during which the Council has declared that part to be closed to the public and which closure is indicated by a sign on or adjacent to that land to that effect;
 - 5.15.2 where land is enclosed with fences and/or walls and gates, at any time when the gates have been closed and locked; or
 - 5.15.3 where admission charges are payable to enter without paying those charges;
- 5.16 Dead animals**
- dispose of any dead animals or part thereof in any Council rubbish bin unless the Council has designated the bin for that purpose by the erection of a sign or signs;

5.17 Defacing property

deface, paint, spray, write, cut names, letters or make marks on any tree, rock, gate, fence, building, sign, bridge or other property of the Council;

5.18 Distributing

distribute any handbill, book, notice, leaflet, or other printed matter to any bystander, passer-by or other person;

5.19 Donations

ask for, receive or indicate that he or she desires, a donation of money or any other thing;

5.20 Encroachment

erect or place any fencing, posts or other structures or any other items or substances so as to encroach onto the land;

5.21 Entertaining

5.21.1 sing, busk or play a recording or musical instrument for the purpose of, or so as to appear to be for the purpose of, entertaining others whether or not receiving money;

5.21.2 conduct or hold any concert, festival, show, public gathering, circus, meeting, performance or other similar activity;

5.22 Filming

conduct or participate in any filming where the filming is for a commercial purpose;

5.23 Fires

light any fire except:

5.23.1 in a place provided or approved by the Council for that purpose; or

5.23.2 in a portable barbecue, as long as the barbecue is used in an area that is clear of flammable material for a distance of at least four metres; and

5.23.3 in accordance with the *Fire and Emergency Services Act 2005*;

5.24 Fireworks

ignite, explode, discharge or use any fireworks or rockets;

5.25 Flora and fauna

subject to the *Native Vegetation Act 1991* and the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1972*:

- 5.25.1 damage, pick, disturb, interfere with or remove any plant or flower;
 - 5.25.2 lead or drive any animal, or stand or walk, on any flower bed or garden plot;
 - 5.25.3 deposit, dig, damage, disturb, interfere with or remove any soil, stone, wood, clay, gravel, pebbles, timber, bark or any part of the land;
 - 5.25.4 take, interfere with, tease, harm or disturb any animal, bird or marine creature or the eggs or young of any animal, bird or marine creature;
 - 5.25.5 pick, collect, take, interfere with or disturb any fruit, nuts, berries or native seeds;
 - 5.25.6 disturb, interfere with or damage any burrow, nest or habitat of any animal or bird;
 - 5.25.7 use, possess or have control of any device for the purpose of killing or capturing any animal, bird or marine creature;
- 5.26 Interference with land**
- interfere with, alter or damage the land (including a building, structure or fixture located on the land) including:
- 5.26.1 altering the construction or arrangement of the land to permit or facilitate access from an adjacent property;
 - 5.26.2 erecting or installing a structure in, on, across, under or over the land;
 - 5.26.3 changing or interfering with the construction, arrangement or materials of the land;
 - 5.26.4 planting a tree or other vegetation on the land, interfering with the vegetation on the land or removing vegetation from the land; or
 - 5.26.5 otherwise use the land in a manner contrary to the purpose for which the land was designed to be used;
- 5.27 Levying charges**
- levy or collect a fee or charge for admission to any part of local government land;
- 5.28 Liquor**
- excepting sealed containers, consume, carry or be in possession or charge of any liquor in an open container (provided the land constitutes a park or reserve) except on premises in respect of which a licence is in force pursuant to the *Liquor Licensing Act 1997*;
- 5.29 Model aircraft, drones, boats and cars**
- subject to the *Civil Aviation Act 1988*:

- 5.29.1 fly or operate a model aircraft or drone aircraft, boat or remote control vehicle in a manner which may cause injury or discomfort to a person on or in the vicinity of local government land or detract from or be likely to detract from another person's lawful use of and enjoyment of the land; or
- 5.29.2 fly or operate a model aircraft or drone aircraft, boat or remote control vehicle on any local government land to which the Council has resolved this subparagraph applies;
- 5.30 Overhanging articles or displaying personal items**
- suspend or hang any article or thing from any building, verandah, pergola, post or other structure on local government land where it might present a nuisance or danger to any person using local government land or be of an unsightly nature;
- 5.31 Playing area**
- use or occupy a playing area:
- 5.31.1 in such a manner as to damage or be likely to damage the surface of the playing area or infrastructure (above and under ground level);
- 5.31.2 in a manner contrary to the purpose for which the playing area was intended to be used or occupied; or
- 5.31.3 contrary to directions of the Council made by resolution and indicated on a sign displayed adjacent to the playing area;
- 5.32 pontoons**
- install or maintain a pontoon or jetty in any waters;
- 5.33 Removing soil**
- carry away or remove any soil, sand, clay, timber, stones, pebbles, gravel, other organic or inorganic materials or any part of the land;
- 5.34 Repairs to vehicles**
- perform the work of repairing, washing, painting, panel beating or other work of any nature on or to any vehicle, except running repairs in the case of breakdown;
- 5.35 Ropes**
- place a buoy, cable, chain, hawser, rope or net in or across any waters;
- 5.36 Rubbish dumps and rubbish bins**
- remove, dispense, take away or interfere with any rubbish (including bottles, newspapers, cans, containers or packaging) that has been discarded:

5.36.1 in a Council rubbish bin;

5.36.2 in a Council rubbish dump;

5.37 Smoking

5.37.1 smoke tobacco or any other substance in any building;

5.37.2 smoke tobacco or any other substance on any local government land or part thereof to which the Council has resolved this subparagraph shall apply;

5.38 Swimming and aquatic activity

subject to the provisions of the *Harbors and Navigation Act 1993* swim in, bathe or enter any waters except:

5.38.1 in waters comprising the sea;

5.38.2 in an area which the Council has determined may be used for such purposes and in accordance with any conditions that the Council may have determined by resolution apply to such use;

5.39 Trading

sell, buy, offer or display anything for sale;

5.40 Use of Water

use any water provided by the Council for the purposes of:

5.40.1 washing any vehicle, boat or trailer;

5.40.2 washing any animal; or

5.40.3 washing or showering any person,

unless the Council has determined the water may be used for such purpose as indicated by a nearby sign;

5.41 Vehicles

5.41.1 drive or propel any vehicle on local government land unless on an area or road that is constructed or set aside by the Council for that purpose;

5.41.2 promote, organise or take part in a race, test or trial of any kind in which vehicles take part, except on an area properly constructed for that purpose;

5.41.3 perform the work of repairing, washing, painting, panel beating or other work of any nature on or to any vehicle, except for running repairs in the case of breakdown;

5.42 Weddings, funerals or special events

- 5.42.1 hold, conduct or participate in a marriage ceremony, funeral or special event; or
- 5.42.2 erect a marquee, stage or structure for the purpose of holding or conducting a wedding, funeral or special event.

6. Prohibited activities

A person must not on any local government land:

6.1 Animals

- 6.1.1 cause or allow any animal to enter, swim, bathe or remain in any waters to the inconvenience, annoyance or danger of any other person bathing or swimming;
- 6.1.2 cause or allow an animal to damage a flowerbed, garden plot, tree, lawn or like thing or place;
- 6.1.3 lead, herd or exercise a horse in such manner as to cause a nuisance or endanger the safety of a person;
- 6.1.4 allow any animal under that person's control to defecate on the land, unless the person immediately removes the faeces and disposes of them in a lawful and suitable manner;

6.2 Boat ramps, marinas and boat ramp parking areas

constituting a boat ramp, marina or boat ramp parking area:

- 6.2.1 undertake any offensive activities;
- 6.2.2 create any unnecessary noise or disturbance, including by operating a boat engine unnecessarily whilst the boat is stationary;
- 6.2.3 carry out any spray painting;
- 6.2.4 chip paint and rust on any boat;

6.3 Fishing

fish in any waters to which the Council has determined this subparagraph applies;

6.4 Glass

wilfully break any glass, china or other brittle material;

6.5 Interference with permitted use

interrupt, disrupt or interfere with any person's use of parks or reserves for which permission has been granted;

6.6 Missiles

throw, roll or discharge any stone, substance or missile to the danger of any person or animal;

6.7 Obstruction

obstruct:

6.7.1 any footpath or bicycle track;

6.7.2 any door, entrance, stairway or aisle in any building; or

6.7.3 any gate or entrance;

6.8 Playing games

play or practise a game:

6.8.1 which is likely to cause damage to the land or anything on it;

6.8.2 in any area where a sign indicates that the game is prohibited;

6.9 Sand dunes, coastal slopes and cliffs

6.9.1 destabilise sand on a sand dune, coastal slope or cliff so as to cause it to unnecessarily mass waste down slope;

6.9.2 destroy, remove or cause interference to live or dead vegetation within a sand dune, coastal slope or coastal cliffs;

6.9.3 introduce non-indigenous flora and fauna;

6.9.4 dump or dispose any material in the sand dunes or down coastal slopes or coastal cliffs;

6.10 Smoking

smoke tobacco or any other substance:

6.10.1 in any building or part of any building; or

6.10.2 on any land to which this subparagraph applies;

6.11 Solicitation

tout or solicit customers for the parking of vehicles or for any other commercial purpose;

6.12 Spitting

spit onto any land or any structure, building or object on or attached to land;

6.13 Toilets

in any public convenience:

- 6.13.1 urinate other than in a urinal or pan or defecate other than in a pan set apart for that purpose;
- 6.13.2 smoke tobacco or any other substance;
- 6.13.3 deposit anything in a pan, urinal or drain which is likely to cause a blockage;
- 6.13.4 use it for a purpose for which it was not designed or constructed;
- 6.13.5 enter any gender specific public convenience unless they are of the specific gender indicated on a sign located on the public convenience, except:
 - 6.13.5.1 where a vulnerable person is escorted into the gender specific toilet facility of their caregiver, parent or guardian;
 - 6.13.5.2 for the purpose of providing assistance to a disabled person;

6.14 Use of equipment

use any item of equipment and/or facilities or other Council property:

- 6.14.1 other than in the manner and for the purpose for which it was designed or set aside; and
- 6.14.2 where any nearby sign states the conditions of use, except in accordance with such conditions; and

6.15 Waste

deposit any domestic or commercial waste or other rubbish emanating from domestic or commercial premises in any Council rubbish bin unless permitted by a sign or signs installed by the Council.

Part 3 - Miscellaneous**7. Directions**

- 7.1 Any person on local government land must comply with any reasonable direction or request from an authorised person relating to:
 - 7.1.1 that person's use of the land;
 - 7.1.2 that person's conduct and behaviour on the land;
 - 7.1.3 that person's safety on the land;
 - 7.1.4 the safety of other persons on the land;
 - 7.1.5 the enjoyment of the land by other persons; and

- 7.1.6 the possible damage to lawn, grass, trees, shrubs, buildings, structures or objects on the land.
 - 7.2 If any animal, person or object is found on any local government land in breach of this By-law:
 - 7.2.1 any person in charge of the animal, person or object shall remove it from the local government land on the direction of an authorised person; and
 - 7.2.2 an authorised person may remove the animal or object from the land if a person fails to comply with the direction, or if no person is in charge of it.
 - 7.3 Any person who is committing or has committed a breach of this By-law must immediately comply with a reasonable direction of an authorised person to leave the local government land.
 - 7.4 Any person who encroaches onto or interferes with local government land contrary to this By-law must, at the direction of an authorised person, whether verbal or written, cease the encroachment or interference and remove the source of the encroachment or interference and reinstate the land to the same standard as the state of the land prior to the encroachment or interference.
- 8. **Council may do work**
 - 8.1 If a person fails to remove an encroachment, alteration or interference on local government land in accordance with a direction of an authorised person pursuant to this By-law, the Council may:
 - 8.1.1 undertake the work itself; and
 - 8.1.2 recover the cost of doing so from that person.
 - 8.2 If a person fails to comply with an order of an authorised person made pursuant to section 262 of the Act in respect of a breach of this By-law, the Council may recover its costs of any action taken under section 262(3) of the Act from the person to whom the order was directed.
- 9. **Exemptions**
 - 9.1 The restrictions in this By-law do not apply to any Police Officer, Council Officer or Council employee acting in the course and within the scope of that person's normal duties, or to a contractor while performing work for the Council and while acting under the supervision of a Council Officer, or to an emergency worker performing emergency duties.
 - 9.2 The restriction in subparagraph 5.22 does not apply to any filming conducted for the purposes of gathering or reporting the news.
 - 9.3 The restriction in subparagraph 5.25.7 does not apply for the purposes of any recreational fishing activity.
 - 9.4 The restriction in subparagraph 6.13.5 does not apply when the public convenience is closed for cleaning or maintenance.

9.5 The restrictions in paragraphs 5.1, 5.3, 5.8, 5.13, 5.18, 5.19 and 5.21 of this By-law do not apply to:

9.5.1 electoral matters authorised by a candidate and which relate to a Commonwealth or State election that occurs during the period commencing at 5:00pm on the day before the issue of the writ or writs for the election and ending at the close of polls on polling day; or

9.5.2 electoral matters authorised by a candidate and which relate to an election under the *Local Government Act 1999* or the *Local Government (Elections) Act 1999* that occurs during the period commencing four weeks immediately before the date that has been set (either by or under either Act) for polling day and ending at the close of voting on polling day; or

9.5.3 matters which relate to, and occur during the course of and for the purpose of a referendum.

10. Application

Any of paragraphs 5.4.2, 5.10.1, 5.10.2, 5.10.3, 5.12.2, 5.29.2, 5.37.2, 6.3 and 6.10.2 of this By-law shall apply only in such portion or portions of the area as the Council may by resolution direct from time to time in accordance with Section 246(3)(e) of the *Local Government Act 1999*.

11. Permission for boat related activities

11.1 Without derogating from the provisions of Council's *Permits and Penalties By-law 2019*, a person may obtain permission to undertake any of the activities specified in paragraphs 5.10.1 and 5.10.3 in any of the following ways:

11.1.1 by making application to Council or its duly authorised agent for permission;

11.1.2 by obtaining a permit from a permit vending-machine installed and maintained by the Council on or adjacent to the local government land in question.

11.2 The Council may, at its discretion, set aside land for the parking of vehicles and boat trailers for persons who have obtained permission under this paragraph.

12. Revocation

Council's *By-law No 3 – Local Government Land*, published in the *Gazette* on 8 August 2013, is revoked on the day on which this By-law comes into operation.

The foregoing By-law was duly made and passed at a meeting of the District Council of Ceduna held on the 16th day of October 2019 by an absolute majority of the members for the time being constituting the Council, there being at least two thirds of the members present.

DOGS AND CATS BY-LAW 2019**By-Law No 4 of 2019**

For the management and control of dogs and cats within the Council's area.

Part 1 – Preliminary**1. Short Title**

This By-law may be cited as the *Dogs and Cats By-law 2019*.

2. Commencement

This By-law will come into operation four months after the day on which it is published in the *Gazette* in accordance with Section 249(5) of the *Local Government Act 1999*.

3. Purpose

The objectives of this By-law are to control and manage dogs and cats in the Council area:

- 3.1 to reduce the incidence of environmental nuisance caused by dogs and cats; and
- 3.2 to promote responsible dog and cat ownership; and
- 3.3 to protect the convenience, comfort and safety of members of the public; and
- 3.4 for the good rule and government of the Council area.

4. Definitions

In this By-law:

- 4.1 **approved cattery** means a building, structure or area approved by a relevant authority, pursuant to the *Development Act 1993* for the keeping of cats on a temporary or permanent basis
- 4.2 **approved kennel establishment** means a building, structure or area approved by the relevant authority, pursuant to the *Development Act 1993* for the keeping of dogs on a temporary or permanent basis;
- 4.3 **assistance dog** has the same meaning as in the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*;

- 4.4 **authorised person** means a person appointed as an authorised person pursuant to Section 25A of the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*;
- 4.5 **children's playground** means any enclosed area in which there is equipment, apparatus or other installed devices for the purpose of children's play (or within 5 metres of such devices if there is no enclosed area);
- 4.6 **control**, in relation to a dog, includes the person having ownership, possession or charge of, or authority over, the dog;
- 4.7 **cat** has the same meaning as in the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*;
- 4.8 **dog** has the same meaning as in the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*;
- 4.9 **effective control** means a person exercising effective control of a dog either:
- 4.9.1 by means of a physical restraint;
- 4.9.2 by command, the dog being in close proximity to the person, and the person being able to see the dog at all times;
- 4.10 **identified cat** means a cat identified in the manner set out in regulation 4 of the *Dog and Cat Management Regulations 2017*;
- 4.11 **keep** includes the provision of food or shelter;
- 4.12 **leash** includes any chain or cord;
- 4.13 **local government land** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*;
- 4.14 **nuisance** means:
- 4.14.1 unreasonably interfering with the peace, comfort or convenience of a person, including but not limited to a cat acting aggressively or creating unpleasant noise or odour;
- 4.14.2 acting in a manner that is injurious to a person's real or personal property or offensive or hazardous to health;
- 4.14.3 wandering onto land without the consent of the owner or occupier of the land; or
- 4.14.4 defecating on land without the consent of the owner or occupier of the land;
- 4.15 **park** has the same meaning as in the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*;
- 4.16 **premises** includes:
- 4.16.1 land; and
- 4.16.2 a part of any premises or land;

- 4.17 **public place** has the same meaning as in the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*;
- 4.18 **small premises** means a self-contained residence that is:
- 4.18.1 a residential flat building;
 - 4.18.2 contained in a separate strata unit;
 - 4.18.3 on an allotment less than 600 square metres in area; or
 - 4.18.4 without a secure yard of at least 100 square metres in area;
- 4.19 **township** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*;
- 4.20 **wetland area** includes any park, reserve, scrub, trail or other land adjacent to a wetland; and
- 4.21 **working livestock dog** has the same meaning as in the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*.

Part 2 – Dog Management and Control

5. Dog free areas

- 5.1 A person must not allow a dog in that person's control to be in, or remain in a dog free area.
- 5.2 For the purposes of this paragraph, a **dog free area** is any:
- 5.2.1 local government land; or
 - 5.2.2 public place,
- to which the Council has resolved this paragraph applies.
- 5.3 The restrictions in subparagraph 5.1 do not apply to any assistance dog.

6. Dog on leash areas

- 6.1 A person must not allow a dog under that person's control to be in, or remain in, a dog on leash area unless the dog is secured by a strong leash not exceeding two metres in length which is either:
- 6.1.1 tethered securely to a fixed object capable of securing the dog; or
 - 6.1.2 held by a person capable of controlling the dog and preventing it from being a nuisance or a danger to other persons.
- 6.2 For the purposes of this paragraph, a **dog on leash area** is any:
- 6.2.1 local government land or public place to which the Council has resolved that this paragraph applies;

- 6.2.2 park when organised sport is being played;
- 6.2.3 enclosed children's playground or if a children's playground is not enclosed land within five metres of children's playground equipment;
or
- 6.2.4 wetland area.

7. **Dog exercise areas**

- 7.1 Subject to paragraphs 5 and 6, a person may enter any dog exercise area for the purpose of exercising a dog under his or her control.
- 7.2 For the purposes of this paragraph, a *dog exercise area* is any:
 - 7.2.1 park; or
 - 7.2.2 local government land that the Council has resolved is a dog exercise area.
- 7.3 A person must ensure that any dog under their control remains under effective control while the dog is in a dog exercise area.

8. **Limit on dog numbers**

- 8.1 A person must not, without the Council's permission, keep any dog on any premises where the number of dogs on the premises exceeds the prescribed limit.
- 8.2 Subject to subparagraph 8.3, the *prescribed limit* on the number of dogs to be kept on premises:
 - 8.2.1 in a township, is one dog in a small premises;
 - 8.2.2 in a township, is two dogs in premises other than a small premises;
 - 8.2.3 in a caravan park is one dog per 600 square metres of the area of the park available for occupation in powered sites or cabins;
 - 8.2.4 in a community or homeland, is two dogs in a residential premises;
and
 - 8.2.5 outside of a township, is three dogs (other than working livestock dogs).
- 8.3 For the purposes of calculating the prescribed limit, any dog that is under three months of age is to be disregarded, unless it has lost its juvenile teeth.
- 8.4 The prescribed limit does not apply to:
 - 8.4.1 an approved kennel establishment;
 - 8.4.2 a veterinary practice;
 - 8.4.3 a pet shop;

- 8.4.4 any premises that the Council has exempted from the requirements of this paragraph; or
- 8.4.5 any business involving dogs provided that the business is registered in accordance with the *Dog and Cat Management Act 1995*.
- 8.5 The Council may require a premises that is the subject of an application for permission to keep additional dogs, to be inspected by an authorised person for the purpose of assessing the suitability of the premises for housing dogs.
- 8.6 No dog is to be kept on any premises where, in the opinion of an authorised person, there is no secure or appropriate area where a dog may be effectively confined.
- 8.7 For the purposes of this paragraph, a **community or homeland** means the following areas of Council as determined by Council and identified by notice published in the *Gazette*:
 - 8.7.1 Koonibba;
 - 8.7.2 Dinahline;
 - 8.7.3 Yaralina;
 - 8.7.4 Betts Corner;
 - 8.7.5 Koongawa Dundee;
 - 8.7.6 Warevilla;
 - 8.7.7 Tia Tukia; and
 - 8.7.8 any other parcel of land declared by the Council to constitute a community or homeland for the purposes of this definition.

Part 3 – Cat Management and Control

9. Limit on cat numbers

- 9.1 Subject to paragraph 9.2, a person must not, without the Council's permission keep on any premises:
 - 9.1.1 more than 2 cats; or
 - 9.1.2 a cat of or over the age of 3 months, or which has lost its juvenile teeth, unless the cat is an identified cat.
- 9.2 Paragraph 9.1 does not apply to approved catteries operating in accordance with all required approvals and consents.
- 9.3 The Council may require a premises that is the subject of an application for permission to keep additional cats, be inspected by an authorised person for the purpose of assessing the suitability of the premises for housing cats.

10. Cats not to be a nuisance

An owner or occupier of premises is guilty of an offence if a cat (or cats) kept or allowed to remain on the premises causes a nuisance.

Part 4 – Enforcement

11. Orders

11.1 If a person engages in conduct that is in contravention of this By-law, an authorised person may order that person:

11.1.1 if the conduct is still continuing, to stop the conduct; and

11.1.2 irrespective of whether the conduct is still continuing, to take specified action to remedy the contravention.

11.2 A person must comply with an order under this paragraph.

11.3 If a person does not comply with an order, the authorised person may take action reasonably required to have the order carried out, and the Council may recover its costs from the person to whom the order was directed for any such action taken.

11.4 An authorised person may not use force against a person under this paragraph.

Part 5 – Miscellaneous

12. Application

12.1 The Council may from time to time, by resolution, identify local government land as a dog exercise area in accordance with subparagraph 5.2.2 of this By-law.

12.2 Any of paragraph 5 or subparagraphs 6.2.1, 7.2.2 and 8.2.4 of this By-law shall apply only in such portion or portions of the area as the Council may from time to time, by resolution, direct in accordance with section 246(3)(e) of the *Local Government Act 1999*.

12.3 Where the Council makes a resolution under either of subparagraphs 12.1 or 12.2, the Council's Chief Executive Officer must ensure that:

12.3.1 If the area constitutes local government land, the area is denoted by signs erected by the Council; and

12.3.2 information is provided to the public on the Council's website and in any other manner determined by the Council's Chief Executive Officer.

13. Revocation

Council's *By-law No 4 – Dogs and Cats*, published in the Gazette on 8 August 2013, is revoked on the day on which this By-law comes into operation.

By-law made under the Local Government Act 1999

ROADS BY-LAW 2019**By-Law No 5 of 2019**

For the management, control and regulation of activities on roads in the Council's area.

Part 1 – Preliminary**1. Short Title**

This By-law may be cited as the *Roads By-law 2019*.

2. Commencement

This By-law will come into operation four months after the day on which it is published in the *Gazette* in accordance with Section 249(5) of the *Local Government Act 1999*.

3. Purpose

The objectives of this By-law are to manage and regulate the prescribed uses of roads in the Council area:

- 3.1 to protect the convenience, comfort and safety of road users and members of the public;
- 3.2 to prevent damage to buildings and structures on roads;
- 3.3 to prevent certain nuisances occurring on roads; and
- 3.4 for the good rule and government of the Council area.

4. Interpretation

In this By-law:

- 4.1 **adjacent land** has the same meaning as in the *Australian Road Rules*;
- 4.2 **animal** includes birds and poultry but does not include a dog;
- 4.3 **camp** includes setting up a camp, or causing a tent, caravan, motor home or any other vehicle to remain on the land for the purpose of staying overnight, whether or not any person is in attendance or sleeps on the land;
- 4.4 **effective control** means a person exercising effective control of an animal either:

- 4.4.1 by means of a physical restraint; or
- 4.4.2 by command, the animal being in close proximity to the person, and the person being able to see the animal at all times;
- 4.5 **electoral matter** has the same meaning as in the *Electoral Act 1985* provided that such electoral matter is not capable of causing physical damage or injury to any person within its immediate vicinity;
- 4.6 **emergency worker** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic (Road Rules – Ancillary and Miscellaneous Provisions) Regulations 2014*;
- 4.7 **moveable sign** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*;
- 4.8 **road** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*;
- 4.9 **township** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*; and
- 4.10 **vehicle** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic Act 1961*.

Part 2 – Management of Roads

5. Activities requiring permission

A person must not on any road, without the permission of the Council:

5.1 Advertising

- 5.1.1 display any sign for the purpose of commercial advertising, other than:
 - 5.1.1.1 a moveable sign which is displayed on a public road in accordance with the Council's *Moveable Signs By-law 2019*;
 - 5.1.1.2 a fixed sign advertising the sale or lease of real property that is displayed:
 - (a) temporarily, while the property advertised on the sign is for sale or lease;
 - (b) within 500mm of the property boundary between the road and the property for sale or lease; and
 - (c) parallel to the property boundary between the road and the property for sale or lease;
 - 5.1.2 place or maintain any goods or sign on the road or park or stand a vehicle on the road for the purpose of:
 - 5.1.2.1 soliciting any business from any person; or
 - 5.1.2.2 offering or exposing goods or services for sale.
- provided that this subparagraph 5.1.2 shall not apply to a person who is simply travelling along a road;

5.2 Amplification

use an amplifier or other device whether mechanical or electrical for the purpose of amplifying sound to the public;

5.3 Animals

5.3.1 cause or allow any animal, to stray onto, graze, wander on or be left unattended on any road except where the Council has set aside a track or other area for use by or in connection with an animal of that kind and, then only if under the effective control of a person;

5.3.2 lead, drive or exercise any animal in such a manner as to endanger the safety of any person;

5.3.3 within a township, allow any animal under that person's control to defecate on the road, unless the person immediately removes the faeces and disposes of them in a lawful and suitable manner;

5.4 Camping

5.4.1 erect any tent or other structure of calico, canvas, plastic or similar material as a place of habitation;

5.4.2 camp or remain overnight;

5.5 Donations

ask for or receive or indicate that he or she desires a donation of money or any other thing or otherwise solicit for charitable purposes;

5.6 Driving on formed surface

drive a motor vehicle other than on a portion of the road that has been formed or otherwise set aside by the Council for the driving of motor vehicles, unless it is not reasonably practical to do so;

5.7 Exhibition or display

5.7.1 sing, busk or play any recording or musical instrument for the apparent purpose of either entertaining others or receiving money;

5.7.2 conduct or hold any concert, festival, show, public gathering, street party, circus, meeting, performance or other similar activity;

5.7.3 erect a stage or structure for the purpose of conducting or holding any concert, festival, show, public gathering, street party, circus, meeting, performance or other similar activity;

5.7.4 cause any public exhibitions or displays;

5.8 Fishing

fish from any bridge or other structure on a road to which the Council has resolved this subparagraph shall apply;

5.9 Obstructions

erect, install or place or cause to be erected, installed or placed any structure, object or material of any kind so as to obstruct a road or footway, water-channel, or watercourse in a road;

5.10 Preaching

preach, harangue or otherwise solicit for religious purposes; and

5.11 Repairs to vehicles

perform the work of repairing, washing, painting, panel beating or other work of any nature on or to any vehicle, except for running repairs in the case of breakdown.

6. Prohibited activities**6.1 Spitting**

A person must not spit onto a road or any structure, building or object on or attached to a road.

Part 3 - Miscellaneous**7. Directions**

A person must comply with any reasonable direction or request from an authorised person relating to:

- 7.1 that person's use of the road;
- 7.2 that person's conduct and behaviour on the road;
- 7.3 that person's safety on the road;
- 7.4 the safety and enjoyment of other persons on the road; and
- 7.5 the possible damage to lawn, grass, trees, shrubs, buildings, structures or objects on the road.

8. Removal of animals and directions to persons

8.1 If any animal is found on a road in breach of a By-law any person in charge of the animal shall remove it on the request of an authorised person.

8.2 An authorised person may:

- 8.2.1 remove the animal if a person fails to comply with the request, or if no person is in charge of the animal;
- 8.2.2 direct any person who is considered to be committing or has committed a breach of this By-law to leave that part of the road, and failure to comply with that direction forthwith is a breach of this By-law; and

- 8.2.3 direct any person who is considered to be committing or has committed a breach of this By-law to cease that action and to take specified action to remedy the breach.

9. Exemptions

- 9.1 The restrictions in this By-law do not apply to any Police Officer, Council Officer or Council employee acting in the course and within the scope of that person's normal duties, or to a contractor while performing work for the Council and while acting under the supervision of a Council Officer, or to an emergency worker performing emergency duties.
- 9.2 The restrictions in subparagraphs 5.2 and 5.7 of this By-law do not apply to:
- 9.2.1 electoral matters authorised by a candidate and which relate to a Commonwealth or State election that occurs during the period commencing at 5:00pm on the day before the issue of the writ or writs for the election and ending at the close of polls on polling day; or
- 9.2.2 electoral matters authorised by a candidate and which relate to an election under the *Local Government Act 1999* or the *Local Government (Elections) Act 1999* that occurs during the period commencing four weeks immediately before the date that has been set (either by or under either Act) for polling day and ending at the close of voting on polling day; or
- 9.2.3 matters which relate to, and occur during the course of and for the purpose of a referendum.
- 9.3 Subparagraph 5.6 of this by-law does not apply to a motor vehicle being driven to or from adjacent land by the shortest practical route.

10. Application

Paragraphs 5.8 of this By-law shall apply only in such portion or portions of the area as the Council may by resolution direct from time to time in accordance with Section 246(3)(e) of the *Local Government Act 1999*.

11. Revocation

Council's *By-law No 5 – Roads*, published in the *Gazette* on 8 August 2013, is revoked on the day on which this By-law comes into operation.

By-law made under the Local Government Act 1999

WASTE MANAGEMENT BY-LAW 2019**By-Law No 6 of 2019**

For the management of domestic waste within the Council's area.

Part 1 – Preliminary**1. Short Title**

This By-law may be cited as the *Waste Management By-law 2019*.

2. Commencement

This By-law will come into operation four months after the day on which it is published in the *Gazette* in accordance with Section 249(5) of the *Local Government Act 1999*.

3. Purpose

The objectives of this By-law are to:

- 3.1 prevent and suppress nuisances associated with the storage and collection of domestic waste;
- 3.2 prevent damage to Council property and land;
- 3.3 define the requirements for the use of the Council's domestic kerbside waste collection service;
- 3.4 protect the convenience, comfort and safety of members of the public; and
- 3.5 enhance the amenity of the Council area.

4. Definitions

In this By-law:

- 4.1 ***crossover*** means the portion of a road (usually connected to a driveway on private property) that provides vehicular access to adjoining land;
- 4.2 ***domestic waste*** means any kind of domestic and kitchen waste generated from residences including, but not limited to, broken crockery, clothing, material, broken and cooking glass items, hoses, polystyrene, ropes, green waste and soft plastics, but excludes effluent, liquids, lead acid batteries and any toxic waste;
- 4.3 ***domestic waste container*** means a container for the disposal of domestic waste that is approved by resolution of the Council;

- 4.4 **emergency worker** has the same meaning as in the *Road Traffic (Road Rules – Ancillary and Miscellaneous Provisions) Regulations 2014*;
- 4.5 **hard waste** means any internal and/or external domestic items such as (but not limited to) fridges, and mattresses but excludes any domestic waste or other items as may be specified by the Council and noted on its website;
- 4.6 **maximum allowable weight** in relation to a domestic waste container means the maximum weight set by the Council, by resolution, with respect to a container of a particular size or type;
- 4.7 **person** includes a natural person, a body corporate or incorporated association;
- 4.8 **premises** means premises, excluding vacant land, to which the Council's waste collection service is made available; and
- 4.9 **road** has the same meaning as in the *Local Government Act 1999*.

Part 2 – Waste Collection Services

5. Provide containers

An occupier of premises must keep on his or her premises a domestic waste container.

6. Management of waste collection services

An occupier of premises must:

6.1 Domestic waste

- 6.1.1 ensure that the domestic waste container kept on the premises is of a type approved by the Council; and
- 6.1.2 not place, cause, suffer or permit any waste other than domestic waste to be in a domestic waste container; and

6.2 Keep container clean

cause each domestic waste container kept on the premises to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition and maintained in good order and repair with a closable lid at all times; and

6.3 Sealing of container

cause each domestic waste container to be continuously and securely covered or sealed except when waste is being deposited in or removed from the container; and

6.4 Damage

ensure that each domestic waste container thereon is maintained, repaired or replaced (as necessary) so that it is not damaged or worn to the extent that:

- 6.4.1 it is not robust;

- 6.4.2 it is unable to be moved on its wheels (if any) efficiently;
- 6.4.3 the lid does not seal on the container when closed to prevent rubbish escaping; or
- 6.4.4 its efficiency or use is otherwise impaired; and

6.5 Collection services

- 6.5.1 facilitate the collection and removal of waste from the premises by ensuring all domestic waste containers thereon that contain waste for collection are placed on the road for collection by the Council, its agents or contractors:
 - 6.5.1.1 by 7:00am on the day appointed by the Council for the collection of waste from those premises or the night before that day ; and
 - 6.5.1.2 in a position:
 - (a) adjacent to the kerb (not on the carriageway) so that the front of the domestic waste container faces the road; and
 - (b) not under the overhanging branches of any trees; and
 - (c) if placed on a crossover, only on the part of a crossover (where it abuts the carriageway) that is closest to the edge of the crossover and not in the centre of the crossover or in any other place or manner that may reasonably be considered (in the opinion of an authorised person) to create a restriction or a danger for other pedestrians or vehicular access to the crossover; and
 - (d) as may otherwise be approved or directed by the Council and, wherever practicable, notified to the occupier in writing; and
- 6.5.2 remove all domestic waste containers from the road on the same day as the collection of waste has occurred; and

6.6 Waste

not place any domestic waste container on the road for collection by the Council its agents or contractors:

- 6.6.1 if the weight of the domestic waste container and waste therein exceeds the maximum allowable weight for the container of that type or size;
- 6.6.2 unless the domestic waste container contains only the type of waste that is permitted to be disposed of in the domestic waste container; and

6.7 Hard waste

not place any hard waste on the road for collection by the Council its agents or contractors other than in accordance with any directions issued by the Council and notified to the occupier in writing or on the Council's website.

7. Interference with waste/hard waste

A person must not, without the Council's permission, remove, disburse or interfere with any waste, or hard waste that has been placed on a road or in a domestic waste container on a road for the apparent purpose of collection by the Council, its agents or contractors.

Part 3 – Enforcement

8. Orders

If a person fails to comply with an order of an authorised person made pursuant to section 262 of the *Local Government Act 1999* in respect of a breach of this By-law, the Council may seek to recover its costs of any action taken under section 262(3) of the *Local Government Act 1999* from the person to whom the order was directed.

9. Exemptions

The restrictions in this By-law do not apply to a police officer, emergency worker, Council officer or employee acting in the course of and within the scope of that person's normal duties, or to a contractor while performing work for the Council and while acting under the supervision of a Council officer.
